



Animal Farm: An Allegory

1 Orwell wrote *Animal Farm*, an allegory, because he always criticized

dictatorships and totalitarian societies 2 The Russian Revolution of 1917-1918 was the big revolt of poor farmers and the working class, that lived in poverty and hunger, against Tsar Nicholas II, the emperor. The revolt was led by Lenin and a group of revolutionaries called Bolsheviks 3 The changes in the Seven Commandments were all to the benefit of the pigs that had the intelligence and the power. The changes in the commandments justified the pigs' actions, which were clearly against the original intentions of the commandments. These changes were examples of hypocrisy and lies, brought on by abuse of power and ignorance of the other animals 4 Joseph Stalin became dictator in 1927 and his rule was characterized by fear, secret police and control of all sources of information 5 When the common enemy, Mr Jones, was no longer present, separate classes were created. The natural division between mental and physical work, emphasized by Squealer, justified the existence of separate classes. Squealer was able to convince the other animals that only the pigs could make the right decisions for them 6 The pigs used their intelligence exclusively to their own benefit and well being 7 When power was in the hands of the few pigs, corruption and oppression were rampant, as there was no opposition to stop them. The fierce dogs killed any animals that complained too loudly
